3 | Work & Live Anywhere in the EU



Ever thought about studying in Amsterdam, taking a job in Paris, or retiring in Portugal? The SEM makes it **easy to live, work, and study across Europe**—without visas, work permits, or complicated bureaucracy.


With 450 million people, the SEM is one of the world's **biggest and most competitive markets**. This gives the EU strong bargaining power when negotiating trade deals with other global players.
